How can I access it?

- 1 Visit <https://my.esr.nhs.uk>
- 2 Enter your ESR username and password. Usernames start 209 then include your initial and the first 6 letters of your surname, in capitals, followed by a number e.g. **209TJONES01**.
If you have forgotten your username or password click the '*forgotten username or password*' link on the ESR login page or ring 01625 65 6520.
- 3 Click on your name (top-right corner) and select '**Go to MyESR Portal**' to access your staff record.
- 4 To access your e-learning select **My Learning** in the left-hand menu.

What is ESR?

ESR is your Electronic Staff Record.

Searching BMJ Best Practice

Searching BMJ Best Practice is easy - enter your search terms in the 'Search conditions, symptoms...' box, and BMJ Best Practice will suggest relevant topics. Click the relevant term or press enter to search. You will be shown a list of search results, click on the most relevant to open the topic. You can jump to sections of the topic using the menu at the top of the page.


